

## The Interdict In The Thirteenth Century A Question Of Collective Guilt

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The interdict was an important and frequent event in medieval society. It was an ecclesiastical sanction which had the effect of closing churches and suspending religious services. Often imposed on an entire community because its leaders had violated the rights and laws of the Church, popes exploited it as a political weapon in their conflicts with secular rulers during the 13th century.

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The critical period for this process was the thirteenth century. It was at that time, as this impressive new study demonstrates, that the interdict first achieved full theological elaboration and legal clarification, and also when its status as the chief political sanction of the papacy was established.

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It considers interdicts imposed on three towns: San Gimignano, Dax, and Béziers. It is shown that the interdicts on these three towns largely worked because most clergy observed them. Even so, the lay powers who occasioned these sentences tried to disrupt their enforcement.
